Nicknames

Railroads and nicknames have gone hand-in-hand throughout the years from engineers nicknaming their faithful locomotives with names like Big Boy and Challengers to the railroad executives nicknaming their fast passenger trains like The Crescent, The Tennessean, and The Powhatan Arrow. Even fans would nickname their favorite railroad with corny names like Nights & Weekends,(Norfolk & Western) and one of my favorites Eat Taters and Wear No Clothes (East Tennessee & Western North Carolina). The most predominate of them all are the nicknames that railroad employees would bestow upon each other. Some good, some bad, some in good humor, and some could be down right mean, but nevertheless, the more you would fight it, the more the name would stick.

Interesting enough, the two of the most famous nicknames of American Folklore came from the pages of Railroad history. Here is a brief look at the two:

John Luther Jones rode to fame on April 30, 1900, when he died at the throttle of the Cannonball Express when his train rear-ended a stalled freight train at Vaughn, Mississippi. What was it that enshrined him in the halls of history? The accident? The train? The act of bravery by staying at the throttle and becoming the only casualty? The nickname of Casey? Of course the answer is all of the above. The song about the accident propelled him to stardom, but his birth name was never mentioned in it. Legend has it that there was several John Jones' so his fellow employees dubbed him Casey, the name of his hometown.

Joseph A. Broady was a known to be a fast, reckless engineer beginning with service on the Norfolk and Western, which fired him due to too many rule violations, and ending on the Southern Railway with tragedy on September, 27 1903, when he was at the throttle of locomotive 1102 as Old 97 plunged off Stillhouse Trestle in Danville, VA. What secured his place in history? Was it the wreck? Maybe it was his attempt to get her into Spencer on time? Was it that he was going 90 miles an hour? Or was it his nickname of Steve? Once again, the answer is all the above. The song ensured Joseph's place in the pages of history, but once again, his real name was never mentioned. His fellow employees were well aware of his reckless work

was never mentioned. His fellow employees were well aware of his reckless work habits and nicknamed him "Steve" after the infamous Steve Brodie who gained daredevil status after claiming to dive off the Brooklyn Bridge in New York in 1886.

Two famous accidents and two birth given names lost in history because of nicknames.

Today's modern railroads are becoming more formal, and nicknames on a corporate level are slowly fading into the past. Already gone are the days of the Chessie and the hickory stripped bibs and cap. They have been replaced with lettered logos that have become company names as well. CSX, BNSF, NS on t-shirts, blue jeans, and ball caps are the clothing choices of today's railroaders. Management now frowns upon personnel nicknames, and has put out memos discouraging them in fears of employees being offended by them and the possibility of lawsuits. However we still occasionally hand out a nickname here and there to deserving recipients, and here are a few examples of employees whom I have had the pleasure of working with, and I know that they accept their nicknames just as if it were on their Birth certificate.

BONECRUSHER: (It is rumored that he has broken just about every bone in his body at one point or the other.)

MARIO: (Yes, he looks just like the Nintendo Game Character)

SPLINTERHEAD: (A can of hair styling Mousse and a spiked hairdo brought this one on.)

HOOCH: (He resembles the dog from the movie "Turner and

Hooch"...he does)

BULLDOG: (Looks like one.)

C-DOGG: (no idea!)

MULE: (He is as stubborn as one) SPIKEDOCTOR: (Believes he is the best there is at driving a spike.) But the most re-curing nicknames that I have heard are PEANUT and MOOSE.

Oh and me...due to my large stature, my foreman in 1997 gave me my nickname that I still hold to this day...**Heavy Duty**...and I wouldn't have it any other way.



Rail News from Jeff Jones

NORFOLK, VA—During the snow storm the weekend before Christmas, Norfolk Southern told customers it was keeping in place a "force majeure" declaration for coal deliveries, after absorbing damage to its big ocean terminal for coal loadings onto ships just as it was recovering from the massive winter storm, according to the Journal of Commerce. NS first declared force majeure on Dec. 18, as what turned out to be a record snowfall began moving into the Appalachian and mid-Atlantic states at the center of the NS rail map. Invoking that clause --for unanticipated disruptions to normal service conditions -- allows a railroad to lift delivery guarantees tied to its pricing. The snow paralyzed commerce across the region for the next week and then required days more to get highway and rail traffic flowing smoothly as crews removed

downed trees on the track, repaired broken rail and waited in parts of Tennessee and Virginia for electricity to be restored. But NS said its huge Lambert's Point trans-loading terminal, on the Elizabeth River at Norfolk, Va., suffered machinery damage on Dec. 26 and again Dec. 27. Normally the facility can load two ships at a time with Appalachian coal using separate conveyor belt systems that dump the coal into a ship's hold. The incidents took out first one conveyor and then the other. NS said Dec. 29 that "while service had been restored following winter storm conditions," the problems at Lambert's Point rendered both ship loaders temporarily inoperable." In the first week in January, NS said "most rail service had returned to normal."



NORFOLK, VA -According to NS Chairman and CEO Wick Moorman on page 26 of the current issue of Railway Age, "At this time, we don't anticipate purchasing new locomotives or freight cars in 2010. We will be increasing our investments in technology to improve the utilization of our fleet. We are enhancing our locomotive and car management systems to give us sophisticated ways to manage service delivery and determine the optimal size of our fleet. We're also investing in locomotive technology that reduces our carbon footprint." The entire article may be viewed at http://www.railwayage.com/in-this-issue/2010-freight-rail-outlook.html

MARTINSBURG, WV-Virginia's only inland port near Front Royal, VA, has been a magnet for 24 major companies, about \$600 million in investment and has contributed to the creation of about 7,000 jobs, according to the state's port authority. The inland port has been a "catalyst" for economic development in the northern Shenandoah Valley since it opened in 1989, said Greg Edwards, external affairs director for the port authority. Virginia's intermodal connection in the Warren County community of Cedarville is close to the intersection of Interstates 66 and 81, Edwards said. The port is connected to the seaports of Virginia's Hampton Roads region by NS railroad service, and its largest customers are The Home Depot, Family Dollar and the makers of Red Bull energy drink with large distribution centers nearby.

JACKSONVILLE, FL-At press time, CSX Corporation was expected to present its fourth-quarter earnings on Wednesday, January 20, 2010 at 8:30 a.m. Eastern Time via teleconference and live internet webcast. The company expected to issue its fourth-quarter and year-end financial and operating results after the market close on Tuesday, January 19, 2010. 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

Knoxville's Phillip Brooks wins Carter Railroad Museum logo contest

Phillip Brooks of Knoxville submitted the winning entry in ETSU's George L. Carter Railroad Museum logo

Brooks was recognized and received a \$500 cash prize during an award ceremony today (Dec. 3) at the Tennessee Credit Union branch at 310 Sunset Drive.

The logo contest was held in November in conjunction with the Carter Railroad Museum's second anniversary and National Model Railroad Month. Artists of all ages were invited to participate in the contest, which was coordinated by the museum, ETSU and the Mountain Empire Model Railroaders (MEMAR)

Brooks, a 1982 ETSU graphic design alumnus, is a model railroader and a fan of Southeastern railroading, history and modeling.

"The logo incorporates design elements important to George L. Carter's life and work," Brooks wrote in a letter accompanying his entry. "The shape of the logo and locomotive artwork echo Carter's own Clinchfield Railroad logo, and frame a stylized Carter portrait. The locomotives are early EMD 'F' units, which were also used by the Clinchfield.

"Another nod to local railroad history is the use of Southern Railway's font in the museum name, with gold lettering on a black background reminiscent of Southern's 'tuxedo and gold' scheme. Southern ran through Johnson City until Norfolk & Western and Southern merged to form Norfolk Southern Corp. in the mid-1980s."

The new Railroad Museum logo also incorporates the classic ETSU mountain logo, as required by the

contest rules, as well as the university's colors of blue and gold.

Other participating regional artists whose designs placed in the competition included Tommy G. Tidwell of Johnson City, first runner up; Sandy Green, a school teacher from Erwin, second runner up; and Lillian B. Brooks of Hendersonville, third runner up. They received \$250, \$100 and \$50 respectively in prize money. Funds for the prizes were provided by Tennessee Credit Union.

The Carter Railroad Museum, located in the Campus Center Building, is open to the public every Saturday from 10 a.m.-3 p.m., staffed by volunteers from the MEMRR. Admission is free. For more information, contact Dr. Fred Alsop, museum director, at 439-6838 or alsop@etsu.edu.
