GENERAL. The bad weather has taken its toll on the Watauga Valley Mechanical Team for working at the yard these last several weeks. Hopefully the weather will turn around and we can get some of the work done that was planned for this spring.

We have renewed interest in expanding the capacity of the Spring Street Coach Yard. Details will be announced in the coming weeks. Expanding the yard will be required to store our newest piece of equipment, the Clinchfield 100.

Powhatan Arrow coach: is still in service at the North Carolina Transportation Museum in Spencer, NC.

St Augustine coach: has arrived back at the Spring St. Coach Yard to finish the interior work. The mechanical team is working on replacing the rubber tile in the restrooms along with working on the lighting ballast and rewiring in the car.

Moultrie diner: WVRHS&M members have been cleaning the kitchen area.

Crescent Harbor sleeper / lounge: work has resumed on the Genset. Also, head end power wiring repair is going on under the car.

VMT ANNOUNCES THE 611 "DREAM TEAM"

The Virginia Museum of Transportation and the Fire Up 611 Committee have announced the mechanical team for the restoration of the N&W Class J #611 steam passenger locomotive. "This is our dream team," said Beverly T. Fitzpatrick, Jr., executive director of the Virginia Museum of Transportation. "The individuals selected know the 611 better than anyone. We are positive that the 611 is in good hands with this incredible team." The Mechanical Team includes people who worked for the NORFOLK SOUTHERN Steam Department during the 611's last excursion runs in the 1990s. "The mechanical team has the experience, knowledge and dedication to bring the NORFOLK & WESTERN Class J 611 back to life," said J. Preston Claytor, Fire Up 611! Committee Chairman. The date to begin work at NCTM has not been announced.



OUTLINE OF PASSENGER RAIL SERVICE TO ROANOKE TAKES SHAPE

When it begins running in a few years, the train from Roanoke to Washington, DC, will cruise at a top speed of 79 mph, reaching the nation's capital in five hours, according to project requirements. That's a four-hour car trip; however, rail passengers won't have a steering wheel to hang onto and may read, surf the Web or sleep.

State leaders, NORFOLK SOUTHERN and AMTRAK are advancing a plan to start passenger rail service in Roanoke in the form of one daily round-trip train between here and points east and north. The fare hasn't been announced, but a tentative schedule has. The train will leave Roanoke at 6:19 a.m. and arrive at Union Station in Washington at 11:20 a.m. To return, rail passengers will catch the southbound train in Washington at 4:50 p.m. and reach Roanoke, the end of the line, at 9:55 p.m.

Last week, the Virginia Department of Rail and Public Transportation and NS signed a 29-page infrastructure funding agreement. NS will upgrade its rail facilities at state expense, which means new track, signals and facilities in and between Roanoke and Lynchburg. For paying the tab, the state will get track capacity to furnish to AMTRAK, which will operate the service under a separate agreement. The new agreement gave engineers the go-ahead to design the infrastructure in Roanoke, which must include a platform and facilities for maintenance and housing of the train overnight. There's also a detailed timeline and costs.

Construction of infrastructure is scheduled to begin in 2015. The Roanoke facilities should be done in 2016. The state agreed to pay the vast majority of infrastructure costs, a total of \$92.7 million, saying the project "provides public benefits by enhancing the movement of passengers by rail, reducing highway congestion and promoting fuel efficiency."

Roanoke will be responsible for providing a train station adjacent to the platform and for providing parking, the agreement said. It is also focused on upgrading a trackside culvert. NS will pay no costs under the infra-structure agreement, though it would be responsible for certain overruns if any occur.

The service is scheduled to begin operating in September 2017 at the latest. NS agreed to give the passenger train service a guaranteed 30 years of use of its tracks. [Condensed from an article by Jeff Sturgeon / Roanoke Times, January 15, 2014.]

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WMSR ACQUIRES PULLMAN BUSINESS CAR

Former WESTERN MARYLAND RAILWAY executive class car No. 204 was recently donated to the WESTERN MARYLAND SCENIC RAILROAD. During the past few weeks, the car has been prepared for transportation and moved from its current site in Swanton, MD to the WMSR maintenance shops at Ridgeley, WV. The ultimate goal of the Western Maryland Scenic Railroad Foundation is to restore No. 204 to operating condition for use on the WMSR.

The WMSR's acquisition of No. 204 is part of a continuing effort to preserve, restore and operate historic railroad equipment. Built by the

Pullman Company in 1918 and later sold to the WESTERN MARYLAND RAILWAY, No. 204 was used extensively as a business car by WM company executives traveling over the road. ["Automatic Block", Western Maryland NRHS]

RECORD AMTRAK RIDERSHIP

Record AMTRAK ridership was experienced again in Fiscal Year 2013. This continues a long term trend that has seen annual ridership increase from 21 million in 2000 to 31.6 million in 2013. Ridership on the Northeast Corridor was 11.4 million, the second best year ever. Ticket revenue also set an all time record of \$2.1 billion. Growth in ridership has been so great that capacity constraints are limiting further growth on all services. [AMTRAK and the Washington Post]



MORE INFORMATION ON THE RESTORATION OF GSMR STEAM ENGINE #1702

Last month "Whistle Stop" reported on the return of steam to the GREAT SMOKY MOUNTAINS RAILROAD. GSMR is breaking ground in Dillsboro, NC at the construction site of a new engine repair shop. This new indoor facility will be exclusive to the renovation and repair of the engine during the winter months and work can proceed without interruption of weather or other elements. Swain County, in cooperation with GSMR, has also begun soliciting for public bids from qualified private steam restoration contractors. Once selected, these contractors will work alongside current GSMR shop repair employees. The physical work is expected to begin after the engine is relocated from its current location in Dillsboro. After it is carefully transferred to the new engine repair shop the entire project of restoration is expected to take anywhere from 12-18 months.
