

## Jonesborough Depot Railroad Museum Update

Plans call for construction on the railroad museum to begin in early summer. Mike Tilley has been meeting with Jonesborough's Town Manager Bob Browning on the details for the building. Watauga Valley's SOUTHERN Caboose X 450 will be moved to the depot site for display. It will be repainted and restored to its original state. The Depot Committee has also met with Linda and Phil Babb who donated the depot to the town of Jonesborough. Linda and Phil and their son have given us some great ideas on ways to restore the depot to its appearance as it stood for many years in Chuckey, TN.

WVRHS&M members will be doing the planning on the exhibits that will be on display in the museum. Tom Austin of Greeneville, TN donated a semaphore for the station and CSX Transportation donated a signal to be placed beside the station. We have been waiting years for the depot to be erected - now it's really going to happen this summer!

As of this writing, ex-NORFOLK & WESTERN Y6a 2-8-8-2 #2156 remains waiting at the gate for the UNION PACIFIC to pick her up from the St. Louis Museum of Transportation. The rumors as to why she has not moved continue to circulate but nothing factual has been announced. Factually speaking, NORFOLK SOUTHERN has asked to use the Roanoke Chapter Tool Car 1407 to accompany the #2156 back to Roanoke. That will likely make the 1407 the only N&W head end car to ever operate behind each of the 'big three" [A, J and Y class of locomotive]. It has been reported that the #2156 will move in the first quarter of 2015 to Roanoke, where it will be on display at the Virginia Museum of Transportation for five years.



## Tazewell Railroad Depot Added to Virginia Landmarks Register

[By BLAKE STOWERS, Bluefield Daily Telegraph] The Tazewell railroad depot, located 1.5 miles north of the county courthouse, has been added to the. Virginia Landmarks Register

Terry Mullins, chairman of the Tazewell Train Station Preservation Committee, has been spearheading the preservation of the train depot.

"The town was given the deed to the train station several years ago, before I was on town council. And since I've been on town council I've been interested in the town proceeding to do something to save the train station for future generations," Mullins said.

According to Mullins, they're also looking at local funding to bring about the restoration of the train station.

"We had to go through several steps, and we have a consultant who came in from Roanoke with some of the detail specifics. It's quite an involved process of meeting people in the community and a lot of research here at the Tazewell County library," Mullins said. Ann Beckett conducted the research.

"The train station that is still standing and that we're trying to save is actually one of 13 train stations that stood on the Clinch Valley line at one time," Mullins said. [See next page] According to Mullins, restoration has not begun yet on the railroad depot because they're waiting on the historic status that was just approved.

"The town asked us to assemble a committee. We have a committee of about 30 members of the community and the region who are serving on the train station committee. And they have met numerous times. They've donated more than 1,000 hours now between meetings and looking it over, and we even hosted an open house," Mullins said.

According to Mullins, the depot has been empty since the 1970's when it was last used as a freight station.



## CASS SCENIC RAILROAD Update

D&GVR assumed control on January 1<sup>st</sup> and brought some of the mechanical staff back to work. As we get ourselves better organized, more employees will be brought back to work.

In addition to the annual winter work being done on the operational locomotives, we will be completing the long-stalled overhaul of Pacific Coast Shay #2 that has laid in a disassembled state in the Cass Shop for several years. It is our hope to have #2 running sometime this summer.

This year, we plan to have in service: Shay #2 (mid-season); Shay #4; Shay #5 (which will be 110 years old this year!); WESTERN MARYLAND Shay #6; and Heisler #6. Shay #11 is out of service needing boiler inspection - 1472 day inspection.

Our annual Railfan Weekend will be held May 15-17 and will feature all four operational locomotives as well as the Climax operating out of Durbin, WV on the D&GVR. In one weekend you can observe all 3 types of geared locomotives in action. Tickets will be available soon through our website (www.mtn-rail.com).



### 2015 Lincoln Funeral Train

[From "Cinders", Philadelphia NRHS] The 2015 Lincoln Train is an attempt to historically recreate the train that carried President Abraham Lincoln's body after his assassination in 1865 from Washington, D.C. to burial in Springfield, Illinois. Thus far the "train" will consist of a working replica locomotive and a newly-built car intended to resemble the wooden car that actually carried Lincoln's coffin along with that of his son "Willie," who had died three years earlier. The 4-4-0 locomotive Leviathan and the passenger car will follow the route of the original train but will be carried on flatbed trailers over the highway. A display of the engine and car near Philadelphia's National Constitution Center is planned for April 23. 2015, nearly 150 years to the day that the original train stopped in Philadelphia. ## CSX Corporation Announces Record Fourth-Quarter Results

CSX Corporation (NYSE: CSX) announced record fourth-quarter 2014 net earnings of \$491 million, a 15 percent increase from \$426 million for the same period last year. The company also generated record fourth-quarter earnings per share of \$0.49, up 17 percent from \$0.42 per share in 2013.



## Caboose for Sale (House Optional)

[From "Automatic Block", Western Maryland NRHS] In Ridgeley, WV, there sits on a hill a lonely caboose lettered for the C&O Railway. The caboose was a birthday gift from loving wife Linda Thomas to her husband, Richard Thomas, who passed away this past July. The big house on the hill with the caboose is not practicable for one person. Linda has offered to sell the caboose for \$3000 prior to letting the house go. You could also buy the big house and caboose for \$75,000. The location on a hill means a heavy lift off the hill and relocation. The caboose appears to be complete; however, it has friction bearings, so could not be interchanged. Preliminary estimates are \$11,000 for the lift off of the hill plus mileage and possible extras. A scrapper has also made a bid on the caboose.



#### CP Sells DELAWARE & HUDSON Lines to NS

[Keith Barrow, International Railway Journal, November 18, 2014] CANADIAN PACIFIC announced on November 17, 2014 that its DELAWARE & HUDSON RAILWAY (D&H) subsidiary has agreed to sell a 455km (282.7-mile) section of its network in the northeastern United States to NORFOLK SOUTHERN for \$192.6 million. The transaction concerns the line from Sunbury, PA, to Schenectady, NY, which connects with the existing NS network at Sunbury and Binghamton, NY. The acquisition of the line will give NS direct access from Chicago and the southeastern United States to Albany, NY, and the railway's recently-completed intermodal terminal at Mechanicville, NY. NS will also gain improved links to its joint venture subsidiary PAN AM SOUTHERN, which serves New England. The deal will include D&H's shops at Binghamton, NY along with other facilities along the route. NS will also take on 150 D&H employees in the area. The completion of the proposed transaction is subject to approval by the Surface Transportation Board. CP will retain the northern section of the D&H from Montreal to Albany, which carries significant volumes of freight from the Bakken oil field.



## Steamtown Update

["Harrisburg Rail Review", Harrisburg NRHS] There is some positive steam news coming out of Steamtown. The Park Service fired up its rebuilt 0-6-0 Baldwin #26 and put the locomotive through its first full-scale pressure test on December 15. #26 is the switch engine built by Baldwin Locomotive Works in 1929 that will be powering Steamtown's yard shuttles by summer. The engine has been out of commission since 2000, when Steamtown sidelined it for the inspection that the FRA mandates for all locomotives after 1,472 service days. #26 now is back in the locomotive shop where appliances are being taken off in order to prepare it for boiler jacket installation, plus installation of the pistons, valves, rods and anything else needed. She will also get a few more coats of paint. Steamtown's operating season normally begins in the middle of April during National Park Week - the goal for her routine operation to begin. As for ex-B&M 4-6-2 #3713, plans are to begin work on the boiler in 2015. Some delay in restoration occurred when approval from the FRA for a welding repair that was made last year was slow in coming. The new Superintendent of Steamtown, Deborah Conway, would like to have four operating steam locomotives to complete the park's mission, and #3713 is a "top priority."
