COME AND SEE SANTA IN HIS RED CABOOSE



Historic The Southern Railway X450 Caboose at the Chuckey Depot/Museum at Jonesborough will be open for everyone to see Santa Claus greeting quests from the caboose platform Saturday. 17th. December from 3 p.m. to 6 p.m. Santa will greet guests from outside the

caboose, providing the perfect photo opportunity along with a chance for everyone to see the historic 52-year-old railroad caboose. Santa won't just wave; he will talk with the children. The caboose and Chuckey Railroad Museum will also be open prior to the greeting of Santa the same day from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. for tours of the depot and this historic piece of equipment, an additional treat for many children who have never seen a caboose. Santa will ride the car from the North Pole to Jonesborough to greet everyone, giving his reindeers a vacation.

Many railroad enthusiasts in the area are likely familiar with the caboose as the Southern Railway x450. The caboose was used for many years on Southern Railway trains traveling through Jonesborough.

Southern Railway Caboose X450 was built in 1970 and ran the rails for over 22 years before it was donated to the Town of Morristown, TN. It was purchased 17 years ago by the Watauga Valley Railroad Historical Society from the Town of Morristown. It was moved to Jonesborough in 2005 and stored at the Spring St. Rail Yard in Jonesborough. It was restored several years ago and moved to its new home at the Chuckey Depot/Museum, 110 South Second Street in Jonesborough.

This will be a unique opportunity for both young and old to visit Historic Jonesborough, see Santa, see this historic railroad car, and attend the Jonesborough Christmas Parade. This will be a memorable event for the whole family for years to come. Plenty of parking at the depot parking lot will be available.

There is no charge for this event.

America Faces Possible Rail Strike in 2 Weeks

[CNN Business, 11/22/2022] America faces a growing risk of a crippling national freight rail strike in two weeks. The rank-and-file members of the nation's largest rail union, which represents the industry's conductors, rejected a tentative labor deal with freight railroads, the union announced Monday [November 21st].

The nation's second-largest rail union, which represents engineers, ratified its own contract. But the failure of the conductors to ratify their deal is another setback to efforts to avoid a strike.

With these votes, all 12 rail unions have now completed their ratification process, with members of eight of the unions voting in favor of deals and four voting against it. The four unions that have voted not will remain on the job until at least early next month while negotiations are held to try to avoid a strike that could cause widespread disruptions in the nation's still struggling supply chain and overall economy.

If even one of the dozen railroad unions were to go on strike, the other 11 would honor the picket lines, shutting down the railroads.

If a strike goes on for an extended period, it could cause shortages and higher prices for goods including fuel and food. If the four unions that rejected the deals are unable to reach new deals before strike deadlines, Congress could order the railroad workers to remain on the job or return to work.

The two unions that released voting results Monday are the transportation division of the Sheet Metal, Air, Rail, Transportation union (SMART-TD), which represents about 28,000 conductors and the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers and Trainmen (BLET), which represents about 24,000 engineers. The engineers and conductors make up the two-person train crews.

Strasburg (ex-N&W) 475 Accident



[TRAINS.com] Strasburg Rail Road 4-8-0 No. 475, damaged in a November 2nd collision with a piece of track maintenance equipment, is back in operation on the railroad's trains today (Monday, Nov. 7), Strasburg General Manager Jim Hager reports in a note to *Trains News Wire* correspondent Dan Cupper.

The locomotive suffered damage to its smokebox front and door, headlight, and some other parts in the collision with a "trackhoe," or tracked excavator, after running through a misaligned switch onto

a spur where the maintenance machine was parked. No one was injured. The accident was captured by a Virtual Railfan streaming camera; video from that camera was widely shared online. [ED. NOTE: Click https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=oQ5JwKY7ytg for that video.]

The Federal Railroad Administration was scheduled to inspect the locomotive and investigate the incident last week.

No. 475, the only operating 4-8-0 in the U.S., was built by Baldwin in June 1906 and operated on Norfolk & Western until 1962. [ED. NOTE: The 475 served in branch line duties on the Blacksburg Branch between Christiansburg and Blacksburg, Virginia – the "Huckleberry".] It has been at Strasburg since 1991.

On my way home for lunch, one Friday a few months ago, I caught NS 278 coming down the hill approaching McKinley Rd. seconds from crossing over the Defect Detector @ MP 27.2. Today's cargo was shipping containers & Auto Racks. After the last car passed over the detector, I heard a voice coming from the control box and it was the announcement of no defects. There is а speaker in the box.

A little trip down into country, the Washington County, TN. reveals NS 126 passing by the signal and detector @ MP 40.4, eastbound (Washington College Station Rd). Having just left Limestone, TN, "7632" is on its way to the Telford, TN community as continues its journey eastward. An interesting sight is west looking and seeing the rise in the grade before it makes the curve.



Heading south, CSX 7245 is running down the main on the "Highline" in south Johnson City. This section of track parallel to runs Highridge Road and along the base of Buffalo Mtn. This Mixed Freight is rumbling by with a single unit up front and a pusher on the rear. This is a good place photograph, because of the long straight section of track.
